In 2016 we awarded over \$24,000 to help children who are in foster care and young people who have aged out. Recognizing that education is critical to the growth and future success of all children in foster care, it is not surprising that a great number of our awards in 2016 were in the area of education, including our scholarships. These awards expanded educational horizons and helped young people succeed in school. We, of course, continued to award funds to help foster kids engage in normal childhood activities.

Here are some ways in which you, our donors, made a **difference in a child's future:** (Except for the first recipient, the names of the youth are changed to protect their privacy.)

HOLLY. Holly Raines-Baxter is an outstanding young woman who worked to overcome severe circumstances. She grew up in poverty, often staying in homeless shelters and skipping meals for lack of food. Holly entered the foster care system at 14, was reunified with her mother and then was back in foster care when her mother died a year later.

Her struggles growing up motivated her to go to college, but once there she often had to work two jobs and care for family members, as well as study. She received scholarships from NMFFC for four years; each year she split the money between two semesters and used it for buying books and other

supplies. In 2016, Holly was the recipient Beth Seewald Memorial Scholarship. Her courage is an inspiration, and her educational achievements are enviable:

Holly received her Master of Social Work degree from New Mexico State University on May 13, 2017, and is now a therapist with the Southwest Family Guidance Center working with at-risk adolescents. Congratulations, Holly! We are proud of you!

JUAN. Juan came into custody with challenging behaviors caused by trauma. His treatment team recommended an enhanced summer educational program for him. CYFD paid for part of this STEM program and, when CYFD funds were exhausted, NMFFC paid the remaining fees. The experience was so positive for Juan that each day he asked his foster mom to come for him as late as possible because he was having such a wonderful time.

The STEM program staff taught Juan new science and math concepts while showing him that there are many adults whom he can trust, which is a critical issue for him.

PAUL. Often children in foster care need a relatively calm environment to help them feel safe and protected. Paul was moved from a private pre-school to kindergarten in a public school, but the larger classroom with lots of kids proved very stressful for him. Paul's difficult behaviors increased as he became more and more distressed in the new classroom.

Paul's previous school had a place for him in their kindergarten program. It took a partial scholarship, a private donor, his foster parents and NMFFC to make this placement a reality. We covered two months' tuition (at a generously reduced rate) while funding arrangements were put in place. Although we normally do not pay tuition, this was an unusual situation requiring special consideration for a five-year-old.

REBECCA. Rebecca, an NMFFC scholarship recipient, earned a place in her university's choir, which was chosen to perform in Paris and London. Our modest scholarship allowed her to pay some of her basic expenses as she embarked on this once-in-a-lifetime experience - performing in Europe.

Rebecca spent six years in foster care and, in her own words, was an angry and destructive child with learning disabilities when she was adopted into an amazingly supportive and loving family. Together, they discovered that music was the key to unlocking Rebecca's potential and creating a career path for her. She is now working

toward a master's degree in music therapy for adolescents.

Hal the Happy Bulldog (who has braces!) now resides in the homes of Haltom Orthodontics' patients and friends, where he is a reminder that his purchase is making a difference in the lives of foster children -- one smiling bulldog at a time.

Please help us help foster kids be kids. With every bike or skateboard, sports uniform or swimming class, music or art lesson, a foster child becomes a kid again. They become a part of their community and they feel like a kid – exactly how we want every child to feel.

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New Law to Help Foster Youth Succeed in School

Foster youth often find their education disrupted and the track to graduation derailed. When they must change schools, their new school may not have their old school records, they may not get credit for classes they have completed, they may not be placed in the correct classes and, as graduation approaches, they find that they can't graduate. A group of former foster youth here in New Mexico lobbied the 2017 Legislature to pass a law to change all this.

The **Support for Transferring Students Law**, SB 213/HB 301, requires that a foster child's old school provide the child's records to the new school promptly upon transfer.

The law also gives the student whose education has been disrupted:

- priority placement in classes that meet state graduation requirements, and
- timely placement in elective classes comparable to those in the previous school.

For foster youth who are in high school, the new school must also ensure:

- equal access to extracurricular activities, career and technical programs, and other special programs for which the student qualifies,
- timely advice from counselors to improve college or career readiness, and
- that the student can graduate if he or she meets state graduation requirements, even if the new district has different standards.
